

Professor Glynis Jones FBA graduated with a BSc in Zoology from the University of Wales (Cardiff) in 1971 and for a few years she taught science to school age students in the UK and Athens before joining the British School at Athens as a research assistant in the Fitch Laboratory for archaeological science. She returned to the UK in 1978 to study archaeology at the University of Cambridge, gaining an MSc and PhD, and subsequently took up a post as Environmental Supervisor at the Department of Urban Archaeology at the

Museum of London. Since 1984, she has been based at the University of Sheffield, where she is currently an Emeritus Professor. Her research interests include the origins and spread of agriculture and the investigation of crop domestication and spread through plant ecology and DNA analysis; the use of weed ecology and stable isotope analysis in the identification of early crop husbandry practices; and ethnoarchaeological approaches to the investigation of early farming. She has led or participated in a succession of ERC- and NERC-funded projects in these fields and conducted archaeological, ethnographic and ecological field work in Britain, the Mediterranean, and southwest Asia. She has taught a generation of archaeobotanists, many of whom now hold academic and professional posts across Europe and beyond.
